
4. Use the Fundamental Theorem of Homomorphism for Groups to prove the following theorem, which is called the **Zassenhaus** (Butterfly) Lemma:

Let H and K be subgroups of a group G and H' and K' be normal subgroups of H and K, respectively. Then

- i) $H'(H \cap K') \triangleleft H'(H \cap K)$
- ii) $K'(H' \cap K) \triangleleft K'(H \cap K)$

$$\frac{\mathrm{H}'(\mathrm{H} \cap \mathrm{K})}{\mathrm{H}'(\mathrm{H} \cap \mathrm{K}')} \approx \frac{\mathrm{K}'(\mathrm{H} \cap \mathrm{K})}{\mathrm{K}'(\mathrm{H}' \cap \mathrm{K})} \approx \frac{(\mathrm{H} \cap \mathrm{K})}{(\mathrm{H}' \cap \mathrm{K})(\mathrm{H} \cap \mathrm{K}')}$$

 - i) For any ring R and a, $b \in R$, $(a + b)^2 = a^2 + 2ab + b^2$.
 - ii) Every ring has at least two elements.
 - iii) If R is a ring with identity and I is an ideal of R, then the identity of R/I is the same as the identity of R.
 - iv) If $f : R \to S$ is a ring homomorphism, then it is a group homomorphism from (R, +) to (S, +).
 - v) If R is a ring, then any ring homomorphism from $R \times R$ into R is surjective.
